

Established in 1989, the Yukon Native Teacher Education Program (YNTEP) emerged from a shared vision for transformative change in Yukon schools—one voiced by First Nation chiefs and Elders, community members, educators and politicians who recognized the urgent need for Indigenous representation and cultural relevance in education. These degrees are offered in partnership with the University of Regina.

Practical Nurse



If you have a desire to work in dynamic environments providing high-quality nursing care in hospitals, long term care facilities, community and other health care services, then consider a career as a practical nurse. This diploma is offered in partnership with Bow Valley College.

Yukon Native Teacher Education Program (YNTEP)

A four-year, 120-credit program leading to a Bachelor of Education.

Bachelor of Education After Degree (BEAD)

A two-year, 60-credit program leading to a Bachelor of Education.

Social Work

Gain the knowledge, values and skills you need to practice social work in northern and remote communities. This program gives particular attention to the social needs, values and aspirations of Yukon First Nations. This degree is offered in partnership with the University of Regina.

"When I left Inuvik to come to Whitehorse for the YNTEP/BEAD program, I didn't fully realize how life-changing it would be. The program gave me the tools I needed to become a teacher, but it also gave me something even more important: a deeper connection to who I am and where I come from.

One of the most powerful parts of my experience was the culture camps—being out on the land, learning from Elders and knowledge holders, and connecting with other future Indigenous educators. It reminded me of the strength and beauty in our ways of knowing. It wasn't just about earning a degree. It was about reconnecting, healing and preparing to bring that strength back to our communities.

I plan to teach in the North and with that I carry those experiences with me every day. I'm proud to be back where I started, giving back to the youth and helping them see the value in their own stories too."

Yukon School of Visual Arts

The Yukon School of Visual Arts (SOVA) offers a rigourous eight-month foundation year program in the sub-arctic community of Dawson City, situated within the Traditional Territory of the Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in. Experience world-renowned faculty, small class sizes, custom-designed studio spaces and a vibrant arts community. SOVA is an incredibly unique option for your first year of art school or as a stand-alone program—a great place to start working as an artist!



Foundation Year



Explore a wide range of materials and mediums in a school setting designed specifically for the YSOVA program—equivalent to the first year of a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree.

Designed and run by artists, for artists, foundation year disciplines include painting, drawing, printmaking, photography, video, sculpture, installation and performance. As a Foundation Year student, you will receive an individual studio space in a shared studio environment for the duration of the program.

Throughout the year there are scheduled field trips to important Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in heritage sites, visiting artist lectures and workshops, and many opportunities to get involved in the arts community of Dawson City.

"I am incredibly grateful for the life-changing opportunity to further explore my art practice at YSOVA. As a mature student and self-taught artist, I have gained valuable skills and discovered new mediums that I hope to incorporate into my work moving forward. The hands-on nature of the classes—spending time on the land, learning about Dawson's history and its connection to us as artists—combined with the experience of living within the community, has made my time at YSOVA truly fulfilling. It's more than just the school, it's the entire experience of creating art while being immersed in this unique place."

School of Science

Immerse yourself in the world of science as you build a deep understanding of the complex systems that shape our planet. From earth and climate sciences to biology, chemistry and physics—explore the foundational disciplines that drive scientific discovery. Delve into environmental science, natural resource management or environmental monitoring to uncover how these fields intersect to solve real-world challenges.

Biological Sciences

This diploma offers a strong two-year (60-credit) foundation towards a degree in biological sciences or health sciences at another institution. You can use this diploma to transfer into a health, medicine, veterinary, or other bachelor's degree in the biological sciences at most Canadian universities.


Earth Sciences Di

Learn not only about the rocks and minerals that make up solid Earth but also about the interactions of these materials with other earth systems through time. Earth scientists play critical roles in understanding natural hazards, stewarding groundwater resources, and meeting our mineral and energy resource needs within the context of a rapidly changing environment. After completion of this two-year diploma, you can transfer credits into a degree program at other universities in Canada

Environmental Monitoring ©

This certificate prepares you for entry-level field work with First Nations or public governments, researchers and businesses working in the environmental services industry. If you are already employed, make environmental monitoring part of your professional development plan.

Renewable Resources Management

Gain the knowledge and skills to manage land, water, forests and wildlife in the North, or prepare for further studies in renewable resource management. Renewable resources include living elements like plants and animals, and non-living elements like air and water. Managing these resources sustainably is crucial to meet present needs without compromising future generations.

Science ©

Start your education and career or just learn more about the natural world in areas such as environmental and life sciences, mathematics, engineering and physical sciences. You can use this certificate to transfer into the second year of a Bachelor of Science program in most Canadian universities.

School of Trades, Technology and Mining

Build your future with accredited pre-apprenticeship programs and apprenticeship training. Our flexible trades training is designed to prepare you for the jobs of today and tomorrow.

Carpentry ©

Develop the practical and theoretical competencies you need to be an asset as a new carpentry apprentice in the construction industry. You will develop a strong foundation in safety practice, learn to work with a wide range of materials and tools, read blueprints, understand the importance of site preparation/building layout, and reinforce mathematical concepts essential to the trade.

Prepare for an exciting career in culinary arts with this program designed to meet growing demand for skilled cooks in the hospitality industry. You'll receive practical hands-on training in our commercial kitchen, and have the opportunity to participate in catering, banquets and community events.

Electrical G

Launch into the electrical trade with this 18-week introductory pre-apprenticeship program. The first 10-week block gives you hands-on learning with tools and materials specific to residential and commercial electrical wiring. The final eight weeks dive into the foundational theoretical concepts used in the electrical field,

preparing you to challenge the Level 1 electrical exam.

Challenge the complexities of truck/transport, construction and mining equipment. This 18-week pre-apprenticeship program builds the technical and practical skills you need to safely enter the workplace as a Level 1 apprentice.

You'll be ready to start working in the exciting profession of welding and to challenge the Level 1 exam of the welding apprenticeship pathway.

RESEARCH

Enrich your education and start building your professional network through opportunities in research. Whether it's research in the lab, classroom or on the land, you'll build skills that will serve you well in your future career.

We facilitate:

- Paid casual work opportunities during the academic year supporting faculty and research professionals.
- Paid full-time student research positions over the summer.
- Research for academic credit, as part of a directed study.
- Research integrated directly into courses.

INDIGENOUS YUKONU

In our commitment to decolonizing education, we integrate Indigenous perspectives, knowledge and ways of knowing across our programming, research, services and student life.

Yukon First Nations Core Competency requirement

Yukon is home to the Traditional Territories of 14 First Nations, each with its own unique heritage, culture, language and governance systems. Understanding the history, current realities—and the role we all play in implementing land claims and self-government agreements—is crucial. All academic programs at YukonU include at least one course designed to satisfy this core competency requirement. You may also choose to complete Yukon First Nations 101, offered through Continuing Studies.

First Nations student services

The First Nations student navigator team and the First Nations student engagement coordinator are here to support First Nations, Métis and Inuit students throughout their educational journey.

First Nations student navigators work individually with Indigenous students to ensure they have access to the resources, information and support they require. Navigators help students during the application process, provide funding advising and facilitate supportive referrals to resources.

The First Nations Student engagement coordinator creates welcoming spaces and community-building opportunities. Their programming and initiatives support Indigenous student well-being and belonging outside of the classroom.



Elders on Campus

We are Elders. Awakening the wisdom.

We are honoured to have Elders contributing to the YukonU community in many ways, from co-instructing workshops and classes to hosting events and fostering connections with knowledge keepers. Based in the *Samay Thia* Harry Allen Lounge, the Elders on Campus organize regular activities, including weekly beading sessions, campfire gatherings and various cultural events.







Located in the heart of the Ayamdigut Campus, this is a gathering space for students, faculty, staff and community members to study, relax and connect with Elders or participate in activities.

Harry Allen was a passionate leader and chief of Champagne and Aishihik First Nations. He played a key role in the 1973 Yukon Settlement negotiations, and later served as chair of the Council for Yukon Indians and vice chair of the Assembly of First Nations. In 1995, he was appointed the first grand chief of the Council of Yukon First Nations, where his leadership and efforts to unite Yukon First Nations left a lasting legacy.



Roddy's Camp

Join us every week at Roddy's Camp for a warm and welcoming gathering, where you can enjoy tea with freshly baked bannock and listen to engaging stories shared by Elders. It's a wonderful opportunity to connect and learn in community.

Roddy Blackjack was an influential leader who played a key role in land claim negotiations. As former chief of Little Salmon-Carmacks First Nation, Roddy was a tireless advocate for his people and culture. He served as an executive Elder for the Council of Yukon First Nations and also served as an Elder-in-residence at what was then Yukon College. His legacy as a key architect of the Yukon Land Claims Agreement continues to shape Indigenous governance and land stewardship in the territory to this day.



STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS

Student Union
