COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will provide a comprehensive understanding of vector drawing with Adobe Illustrator. Students will learn to create, edit and transform vector objects and apply them in several industry standard multimedia communication contexts. There will also be a focus on how to convert artwork, drawings and bitmap images into editable, vector formats.

Admission to the program.

DELIVERY METHODS/FORMAT:

Conventional lecture and demonstration methods are used to present the theory portion while projects and assignments are utilized to reinforce and compliment the theory.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

It is not required that you own a computer, however the appropriate hardware (personal computer/laptop) and the course software (subscription to Adobe Creative Cloud) are strongly encouraged for optimal learning. Students should purchase a USB flash drive, external hard drive or access cloud storage to back-up files and transfer files between school and home.
