COURSE DESCRIPTION

Family-centered introduction to the needs and nursing care of childbearing families. Community resources and client teaching needs are addressed. Learning will be focused on the care of the mother and infant during pregnancy, labour and delivery, and the postpartum period within the context of the family.

Delivery format

This course will include a total of 45 hours of in-person and on-line learning, videoconference classes, and exams. A combination of synchronous (face-to-face and web-conferencing via Zoom) and asynchronous (web-based via Moodle) learning activities are provided. Learning activities may include but are not limited to facilitator-led learning, projects, and on-line exercises.
